13 NEW MEMBERS INDUCTED TO HALL OF FAME

EAST LANSING, Mich. — The State News Alumni Association, representing former staffers of Michigan State University's college daily, inducted 13 new members into the State News Hall of Fame on Friday, April 27.

This year's class of MSU alumni includes journalists, authors, history makers and leading national communicators. They were inducted as part of The State News' end-of-year student awards ceremony at the East Lansing Marriott at University Place.

"You'll find a dozen dazzling alums," said Marcia Van Ness, herself a surprise inductee and chair of the alumni association's Hall of Fame Committee. "These are people who regard their State News experience as vital to their success and continue to salute its influence and ideals."

Dick Beals

The 1949 graduate and one-time cheerleader spent three years covering intramural sports for The State News. Beals went on to become one of America's most prolific voice actors, most notably as the voice of "Speedy Alka-Seltzer" in commercials in the 1950s. He also worked on a number of radio and TV shows, including "Dragnet," "Gunsmoke" and "The Green Hornet."

John Borger

Borger covered student government, the MSU administration and served as campus editor and editor in chief before graduating in 1973. He's spent more than 30 years as a media attorney. Two of his cases representing the Minneapolis Star-Tribune reached the U.S. Supreme Court. A 2004 victory opened a secret process to select a new president for the University of the Minnesota.

Jeff Dionise

Dionise began his career as

an artist for The State News advertising department from 1982-84 and began the comic strip "Eddy." He took artist jobs at the Lansing State Journal and The Detroit News and was art director of the former Knight-Ridder Tribune. He continues at the forefront of computer-assisted graphic illustrations as director of design for USA Today.

Karen Brown Dunlap

After serving as a State News reporter from 1970-71, Dunlap went on to work in reporting, writing and editing positions at the Nashville Banner, Macon News and the St. Petersburg Times. She also served as a professor at the University of South Florida and Tennessee State University.

Dunlap was named president of the nonprofit Poynter Institute, one of the world's most respected journalism education organizations, in 2003. She is also the co-author of two books, "The Effective Editor" and "The Editorial Eye."

Ola Gelzer

When Gelzer was selected by the Board of Publications in 1937 to be managing editor of the Michigan State News, the newspaper announced the move as "upsetting all precedent." Gelzer, of Hillsdale, was the first woman to hold the newsroom's top job. During her term as editor for 1937-38, Gelzer oversaw the weekly State News' move to a three-day-a-week publication. She became president of the family business, H.J. Gelzer & Son Inc., in 1956 and worked there every day until July 1994. She died in February 1995.

Rick Gosselin

After covering sports for The State News, the 1972 MSU graduate worked for UPI, the Kansas City Star and The Dallas Morning News. His expertise on college football is considered so vast that pro football coaches call him for his opinion of players on draft day. In 2004, he was awarded the Dick McCann Memorial Award, which is given annually to a sports writer.

Larry Gustin

As a student in 1959, Gustin was editor of The State News' 50th anniversary edition, compiling a half century of history. During his long career in reporting and public relations, Gustin won numerous awards. He wrote the first acclaimed history of General Motors founder William Durant and the definitive history of the Buick car brand.

Eric Pianin

Pianin was a sports editor, managing editor and executive editor of The State News from 1964-68 and created a monthly tab called the Collage. He's spent 25 years at The Washington Post, most recently as senior political editor of washingtonpost.com. He also is co-author of the book "Mirage: Why Neither Democrats Nor Republicans Can Balance the Budget, End the Deficit and Satisfy the Public."

Larry Pontius

The State News advertising manager in 1960-61, Pontius was creative director for New York-based Gray Advertising's Australia offices from 1968-1972 before returning to MSU as an associate professor of advertising. In 1974, he became director of marketing for Walt Disney World and two years later became vice president of marketing for Disney World and Disneyland. In 1979, he formed his own advertising and video production company. He is the author of the speculative thriller "Waking Walt" and the poetry collection, "Lyrics of Life in Four-Part Harmony."

Victor Spaniolo

Spaniolo has a long history in State News and Michigan journalism. He worked on the campus paper from 1936-40, first as sports editor then as its first graduate student manager. After graduating, he went on to work at the Michigan Farmer, Big Rapids Pioneer, Port Huron Times Herald, Muskegon Chronicle, Greenville Daily News and Battle Creek Enquirer.

He also became the owner of the Charlevoix Courier and, later, several other weeklies. He returned to The State News as a founding member of the first independent board of directors in the 1971 and became president of the board.

Marcia Van Ness

Van Ness is a veteran of The State News in every sense of the term. She was editor in chief during the 1961-62 academic year and returned to the service of the newspaper in 1993 as a member of the State News Inc. board of directors and was named its president in 1998-99.

She is a member of the State News Alumni Association board of directors and is founding chairwoman of the State News Hall of Fame. Her post-college career includes a stint at the Kalamazoo Gazette before moving to the Lansing State Journal in 1966. She was elected president of the Central Michigan Chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists, Sigma Delta Chi in 1978, becoming its first female president in its 28-year history.

Van Ness is also a former president of the East Lansing Community Relations Coalition.

George Weeks

A legend in Michigan journalism, Weeks worked for The State News as a reporter and night editor, graduating from MSU in 1954. He did a stint in the Army and spent 15 years with United Press International before joining Gov. William Milliken's administration as a press secretary and top aide. He returned to journalism in 1983 as a political columnist for The Detroit News.

He retired in 2006, but still does a syndicated column. He has also authored several books on Michigan and state politics.

Dorothy Yates

Dorothy worked for The State News from 1932 to 1936, serving as features editor. She then moved to Midland, becoming society editor and reporter of the Midland County Republican News and then The Midland Daily News.

She would also go on to write several books including cookbooks, a history of her church, histories of museums and the building arts of Midland County.

In 2003, she wrote, "Midland, Michigan, The City That Chemistry Built."

How to nominate

You have until Dec. 15 to nominate winners for the 2008 State News Alumni Association Hall of Fame. We're looking for your State News friends who made a name for themselves while on The State News, in their professional careers or both.

Many State News alumni fit the Hall's criteria of significant contributions to the media or other endeavors. Nominees must have worked for The State News as student or professional staff members in any department or have been members of The State News Board of Directors. Alumni become eligible 10 years after leaving The State News.

Nominations of fellow alumni as well as self-nominations are welcome.

Past inductees include journalists, authors, history makers and leading national communicators. The 2008 class of inductees will be announced early next year and honored at the newspaper's annual student awards banquet on April 25.

I'm not sure how many of you might be aware of it, but there's a bit of an important day coming up for The State

News.

March 10, 2009.

That day marks the 100th anniversary of the student-run newspaper. Certainly it's been an historic run.

We don't know very much about the students who started The Holcad, the weekly newspaper that would become the Michigan State News, and later, The State News. But we do know they cared about their university and their First Amendment rights. Those students wanted to make sure their voices weren't drowned out by a hostile Lansing media.

Nearly a century later, we've got a lot to celebrate. The State News, by whichever name it was known through the years, has continued to cherish the goals set forth by its first student leaders. The newspaper rightfully earned its designation as "MSU's independent voice."

Alumni association board members already have a few ideas on the drawing table to celebrate this milestone, including a reunion in March 2009 and a book about the history of The State News.

But much work remains to be done. The State News only has one centennial to celebrate, after all, and we want to make sure this one is done right. To do that, however, we need your help.

Although we remain closely affiliated with The State News, the alumni association is an independent nonprofit organization. We don't have paid staff, so we rely on volunteers to run every aspect of the group – from event planning to raising money for our scholarship fund to putting together this newsletter. Recent board action

The State News Alumni Association board of directors re-elected Jeremy Steele, Art Langer and Katie Rexrode to their posts.

The board voted unanimously to elect Steele as president, Langer as vice president and Rexrode as secretary-treasury. The trio was first elected to those posts a year ago.

The board also is beginning a search for additional directors to sit on the board. Under the association's bylaws, the board of directors must have seven to 15 members. It now has eight.

New editor in chief elected for 2008

When she was a sophomore in high school, Laura Misjak made a list of 20 careers she wanted to pursue when she grew up.

After skimming through the list compiled of jobs like an artist or a chef, Misjak nailed her destiny — she wanted to be a journalist.

"A journalist is one of those jobs where you wake up and what you plan on doing can be completely different from what you end up doing," Misjak said.

Today, Misjak is preparing to serve as The State News editor in chief for the next year.

Misjak brings a resume filled with different experiences to the table with internships at the

Flint Journal, The Argus-Press and six semesters on The State News staff.

John Foren, local news editor for the Flint Journal, said he was eager to write a recommendation letter to endorse Misjak for the editor in chief position.

"She was very enthusiastic and popular in the newsroom here," Foren said.

"She has a lot of respect for The State News and its institution and reputation."

Misjak was the only staff

member to run for the position as editor-in-chief next semester.

She said the young staff this semester is partially why she was without an opposition.

"I'm one of the most experienced (staff members)," Misjak said.

"Most of the staff has just started in the past year."

Misjak will replace Margaret Harding in the position in the spring.

Harding said she plans to continue working at The State News and graduate in the spring.

"I'm very confident in her abilities as a leader, and I think that she will do a great job," Harding said.

Las Vegas traffic columnist chosen as new editorial adviser

Omar Sofradzija, the Las Vegas Review-Journal's "Road Warrior" columnist with nearly 17 years of professional reporting and editing experience, took over this summer as The State News' editorial adviser.

Sofradzija, who spent 13 years at the Peoria Journal Star before his move to Las Vegas, was chosen from a pool of more than 70 applicants from around the country. He started in mid-July.

The Evanston, Ill., native graduated from Western Illinois University in 1991 after serving in numerous capacities with the student newspaper there. He covered police, suburbs and transportation in Peoria and held weekend editing duties. His Review-Journal work involves a twice-weekly column and multifaceted reporting of transportation issues in Las Vegas. He also covered the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina in 2005.

Sofradzija replaced Perry Parks, the editorial adviser since April 2002.

State News launches Web site redesign

The State News launched a new look for its Web site, www.stateneews.com.

The change was among just a few of the tweaks for the new fall semester, including a feature that allows readers to comment on stories.

Other changes include a smaller print edition.

"We took that change as an opportunity to create a fresher-looking paper that incorporates new ways to tell stories," Editor in Chief Margaret Harding said in a note to readers.

"We've brought that same attitude to our Web site, where you will find audio slideshows, podcasts and videos. In an effort to better connect with you, we've also included an option to comment on stories. We want to hear from you immediately when a story grabs you, for better or worse."

CLASS NOTES

50s

Stephen Bransdorfer, a former State News editor in chief who went on to be deputy U.S. attorney general, died March 15. He was 77.

Bransdorfer worked at The State News from 1947 to 1951.

His brother, Alfred, also was a S'Newser.

He had been battling cancer, which wore down his immunity and left him susceptible to pneumonia, The Grand Rapids Press reported.

"He was a journalism major at Michigan State," his son David Bransdorfer told The Press. "I think journalism was his missed calling."

60s

Cartoonist **Phil Frank** died Sept. 13 after a long battle with a brain tumor.

Frank, the creator of the Farley and Elderberries comic strips, announced his retirement only days earlier.

He was 64.

Frank began cartooning for the State News in 1961. His work was eventually published in 350 campus newspapers. In 1975 his nationally syndicated comic strip "Travels With Farley" was launched, and 10 years later it became "Farley," a local feature exclusive to the San Francisco Chronicle.

Frank was inducted into the inaugural class of the State News Hall of Fame in 2006.

Ben Burns, director of the Wayne State University journalism program and a member of the State News Hall of Fame, was honored for his lifetime achievement by the Detroit Pro Chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists.

70s

Carole Leigh Hutton, former Detroit Free Press editor and publisher, was named executive editor of the San Jose Mercury News. Hutton is a member of the State News Hall of Fame.

Susan Goldberg left her job as executive editor of the San Jose Mercury News to be editor of the Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Former Detroit News Managing Editor **Sue Burzyski** has become a visiting professor at MSU.

90s

Long-time State News Production Manager **D.A. Biermann** — known affectionately, or fearfully, by S'Newsers simply as Dwight — left the newspaper in February. He was replaced by Max Sa Leitao, who has served as assistant production manager. Biermann was a photographer at The State News from 1989-92. He returned in December 1997 as production manager.

Jeff Clemens, a S'News opinion editor from the early '90s, was elected mayor of Lake Worth, a relatively large city in southern Florida. Clemens netted 52 percent of the votes.

Stephanie Tardy is among 20 Detroiters honored by the business newspaper in its 2007 class of "20 in their 20s." She co-founded Handmade Detroit, a membership group that organizes events for crafters to sell their goods.

A Bakersfield, Calif., radio station ran a 12-hour marathon of the satire podcast co-hosted by **Craig Gaines** and **Mike Hudson**, stalwarts at The State News in the late 1990s. "Hudson & Gaines" is a 30-minute drive-time program in the Anytown-esque city of Great Haven on a

local AM station called WBFK.

Hudson (in real life, a 30-year-old marketing professional) plays a small-business-owning conservative who battles with his left-leaning, community college instructor co-host, played by Gaines. For more information on "Hudson & Gaines," go to hudsonandgaines.com.
